Creating a New Landscape



The Master Gardeners have been busy on the Wells Brown grounds making our vision for the lot come true. Taming invasive weeds and vines has occupied plenty of time spent on the corner property. In spring, we were aided by a group who helps refugees in Clarkston. The refugees have been given plots around Clarkston to use as vegetable gardens. They employ bamboo as garden fencing, plant stakes, and vine trellises. They helped remove our bamboo. It was a win-win day in the garden. We were able to help a group in need, and clear some of the invading bamboo in our side yard.

A plan is being drawn by a landscape architect for the back of the corner lot. There will be a walking path between perennials, shrubs and small trees, with benches and a small pond. The old pond was found while clearing the brush. It was probably built by the Wells family when they owned that property. We are excited to have a restoration project among the garden plans. We will try to use as many shrubs and perennials fitting the period of 19th and early 20th century southern gardens. We are very excited to take on this project with the help and guidance of the DeKalb Master Gardeners and the Landscape Architect. Finally, thanks to the Stone Mountain Woman's Club for the donation of an outside wrought iron bench.

Her image was cut off on the cover of the SMHS photographic book due to space concerns which is why I never noticed it before. Becky Sanders was able to identify her as Sara White and we would love to have more information about her and her family.


